Freshly cut trees with the beauty and aroma you remember from childhood.

Simple Tips for Keeping Your Christmas Tree Fresh

Place in a bucket of water outside by a garage or other protected site if you will not be bringing the tree in to decorate it right away.

Make a fresh cut straight across the trunk about 1" from the bottom. This should be done just before placing in the tree stand with water.

Do not place the tree near a fireplace, vent, heat source, television set, or a sunny window where it is more prone to dry out.

Check the water level daily. Never allow a fresh cut tree to dry out. A tree could use up to one quart of water in one day.

Unplug tree lights before going to bed or when leaving the house.

Varieties of Christmas Trees Available at Green View

White Pine-graceful, soft branches

Scotch Pine-shorter, stiffer needles and more open than the white pine

Balsam Fir-fragrant, short needles, and old-fashioned open look

Fraser Fir-fragrant, shiny dark green short needles, best needle retention.

Concolor Fir-bluish green short needles, good needle retention

Noble Fir-bluish green short needles, good needle retention

Douglas Fir-dark green or bluish green short needles

Grand Fir-medium green short needles, good needle retention

Tips to Keeping your Greens Fresh

Spray with an antidesiccant such as *Wilt-Pruf* to retain moisture.

Place the greens in a cool spot protected from excessive winds or direct sun, which causes drying quicker.

Place in a container that can hold water if bringing greens indoors. Keep a constant water supply as you would for a cut Christmas tree.
